***STANO SMASHES 35KM WR IN PODEBRADY**
Report in 'International News'

****WALKER OF THE WEEK****



It's a three-way WOTW award this week, with **Rhydian Cowley (VIC)**, **Rebecca Henderson (VIC)** and **Tim Fraser (ACT)** all earning the gong following outstanding performances at the AV road championships on Sunday at Middle Park.

Rhydian and **Bec**, competing in the AV 30km titles, each took the gold under different circumstances. In **Rhyd's** case, with the Jared Tallent Trophy on the line, it was a matter of managing the substantial challenges of Will Thompson and Mitchell Baker. Each flung everything at Rhydian at different times, forcing the Paris Olympic bronze medallist to produce the goods over the final 10km. And produce them he did, with a huge negative split comprising two sub-21 min 5km splits for a commanding win in **2:05:31**.

For **Bec**, the incentive was to amass enough WA points to earn automatic selection for the 35km at the World T&F championships in Tokyo. Sunday's performance – a 30km time of **2:19:53** – did her chances no harm at all. Bec set an Australian 35km record at last year's LBG 35km in Canberra, so it would be interesting to see what her intermediate 30km time was then, and how it compares to her Sunday result.

The third winner, **Tim**, chose to compete in the 20km non-championship race. With the Racewalk Australia site currently down, it's uncertain whether his winning time of **1:21:15** is a PB but if it isn't, it must be close. Either way, it's another top-level performance for the ACT walker whose improvement over the past 12 months has been astonishing, resulting in his selection as an emergency for the Paris Olympics last year.

Congratulations to Rhyd, Bec and Tim. There were many young walkers out there who are just starting their race walking careers, and what you demonstrated on Sunday is bound to inspire at least a few of them to aim for the heights.

***Honourable mentions**

- **Mitchell Baker (ACT)** and **Will Thompson (VIC)** – each bit the bullet in his effort to open a winning gap in the 30km, eventually placing with times of **2:12:51** and **2:08:41** respectively.

- **Alejandro Stephens (VIC)** – PB's by over 29 mins don't grow on trees. His 30km time of **2:35:29** was a major step up.

***SIMON BAKER, OAM – VRWC LIFE MEMBER**



- It's been an 18-month wait, but on Sunday we finally nailed down the elusive **Simon Baker** in front of a substantial Club gathering, to present him with the **VRWC Life Membership** he was awarded at the Annual General meeting in 2023 – without ever realising it.

Never one to big note himself, Simon has been ‘walking the walk’ as a coach and educator for the benefit of emerging race walkers since well before the end of his own elite racing days in 1996. To outline Simon’s career and contribution, it’s fitting that his fellow Order of Australia member, **Tim Erickson**, be granted the floor:

‘Simon Baker first joined VRWC in the mid 1970s and has maintained his association ever since, a timeframe of nearly 50 years! Although never a committee member (as far as I know), his contributions, first as an international athlete and then as a coach and as a VRWC official, add up to a lifetime contributing to our Victorian and Australian racewalking landscapes.

A former AIS racewalking coach, he has been a regular presenter at our VRWC coaching clinics over many years. He also coordinated and ran the highly successful VRWC Falls Creek Camps from 2010 to 2017. He also had a large and successful development squad based at Knox for many years, and still coaches Rebecca Henderson, one of our current Olympians.

Simon was awarded an AOM in January 2018 for services to athletics.

We are almost certainly well behind the eight ball in considering him for a VRWC life membership. I have no hesitation in recommending we rectify that omission at our 2023 AGM.

- The Australian Team for the **World University Games** in Bochum (GER) in July, has been announced. It contains three current or former VRWC members – **Bec Henderson**, **Will Thompson** and **Corey Dickson** (now based in the ACT) – adding further notches to the Club’s international representation bow. Joining them will be **Olivia Sandery (SA)**, **Lizzie McMillen (NSW)**, **Allanah Pitcher (NSW)**, **Alexandra Griffin (WA)**, **Isaac Beacroft (NSW)**, **Mitchell Baker (ACT)** and **Tim Fraser (ACT)**. This is a powerful contingent which, like its predecessors, will be flying the flag for race walking in the English-speaking countries.

AA’s **Sascha Rayner** included the following in her selection announcement:

Australia’s race walking legacy at the World University Games will again be on display, with 2023 20km Race Walking team medallists **Will Thompson (VIC)**, **Mitchell Baker (ACT)** and **Tim Fraser (ACT)** returning alongside Beacroft and **Corey Dickson (ACT)**, this time with their sights set on gold.

“Chengdu in 2023 was an amazing experience where I got to experience proper championship racing for the first time. It was my first time preparing for and peaking for a championship at that time of the year and I learnt heaps of valuable lessons,” Thompson said.

“The team bronze was a really nice experience, especially being able to do it alongside those boys. We’ve certainly all improved nicely over the last two years and I’m sure that if we all show up to what we’re capable of on the day, we’ll be able to fight for medals again.”

Congratulations to our reps in Germany. We know they’ll spare no effort in posting the best possible results in the green and gold.

VRWC AV 30km, AV Schools & VRWC championships, Sunday 18 May – Middle Park

A freezing dawn blossomed into a perfect morning for racing at Middle Park, ideal for the AV 30km, Schools and VRWC championships, plus ancillary events. We had, in all, 49 starters from 54 entries (perhaps the other five's doonas turned into Mario Milano and pinned them), with some hard-fought contests and a number of PBs resulting.

Unfortunately, the *Racewalk Australia* website is down at the time of writing, so a list of the day's PBs will appear next week if I don't get them before Tuesday.



AV Championships

****AV Open 30km Road walk championships**

Grasping the opportunity to score valuable WA qualifying points for Tokyo, **Rebecca Henderson** poured it on to clock an excellent **2:19:53** for the AV 30km title. Extrapolated, this would have equated to around 2:43:00 for 35km, putting her well in the mix for a 35k berth in Tokyo.¹ India's **Priyanka Goswami**, another with a qualifier already up her sleeve, was here for the points also and took silver in **2:26:54**, a very creditable performance in an unfamiliar racing environment. **Laura Langley** (NZL) walked an even-paced 20km before encountering and prevailing against the lactate wall for 3rd in **2:45:38**.

In the Men's championship, **Mitchell Baker** (ACT) set out with a vengeance and covered the first 5km in a snappy 21:01, with **Rhydian Cowley** and **Will Thompson** matching strides 10 secs in arrears. By half-way the three had drawn level and it was Thompson's turn to put the hammer down with a sub-21:00 leg that gave him a 17 sec lead over Baker and Cowley at 20km. Soon after, Baker was sent the bill for his aggressive start as Rhydian struck, reeling off 5k splits of 20:46 and 20:26 to

overwhelm Thompson and win with a world-class time of **2:05:31** – just 25 secs shy of Nathan Deakes’ national record – to retain the Jared Tallent Trophy. Will had pretty much drained the tank by the final 5k but hung on well for **2:08:41** and silver in his first official 30km (he done it before in 35k races, of course.) Mitch was also doing it on G&D over the final 10km but was still capable of sub-5:00 laps, taking 3rd place in **2:12:51**.

The final AV finisher, **Alejandro Stephens**, walked his own race and realised a PB of 29:02 – now that’s something you don’t see often! – for the official championship bronze in **2:35:39**. Stephens’ only prior experience of this distance was in 2023 when he dragged himself around the Stromlo Sports track thirty times in that year’s LBG carnival to finish in over three hours – although, it must be said, he did faster *en route* last year in the AV 35km title.

It’s fortunate that a good number of Schools and VRWC junior walkers were present, as the chance for them to see distance racing of this calibre by elite walkers at club level is becoming rarer. It was also special for them to see those top walkers up close at the presentation, receiving their medals and even handing the successful youngsters their own medals afterwards.

****AV Schools Road walk championships**

A total of 17 lined up for these championship races, which catered for U14 to U20 entrants. This is of concern, particularly as the U20 10km attracted no competitors at all and the U18 5km saw no girls and only two boys. It is hoped that, with an encouraging influx of primary school-aged athletes into the club, most will wish to consolidate their development as walkers and to progress to those vital teenage ranks, in which future senior champions and international reps are nurtured.

The best result of the day came from U16 girl **Ela Uzun**, whose **13:27** in the 3km – adding to a string of similarly fast 3000m times and a national track title over the summer – would dispel any doubt as to Ela’s plans for her future in the sport.

The U14s supplied the largest field of the day. **Alaska Bremner** walked an excellent 3km race from the front for a convincing win in **16:54**. Behind her, **Pippa Read** and **Addi Frenken** revived their arm-wrestling rivalry of last year to hit the line almost together in the same time of **17:12**. The only boys’ entrant, **Tate McQueen**, added some spice to the contest and showed he’d lost little of the form that garnered him a bronze medal in the AA track titles in Perth.

Stano smashes world 35km race walk record in Podebrady

Italy's **Massimo Stano** broke the short-lived world 35km race walk record at the European Race Walking Team Championships - a **World Athletics Race Walking Tour Gold** meeting - in Podebrady on Sunday (18) by a massive 57 seconds.

The **2:20:43** recorded by the 2021 Olympic champion comfortably eclipsed the 2:21:40 set by Canadian Evan Dunfee in March, which in itself was seven seconds quicker than the 2:21:47 recorded by Japan's Masatora Kawano last October.

Stano took the lead at 23km, and went through the gears to record laps under 4:00/min in the closing stages. In fact, 5km short of the finish the Italian notched an incredible 3:54 for his 30th circuit. He was actively encouraging the crowd around the spa town course to cheer him to the finish and looked barely out of breath as he crossed the line.

In the far distance, **Christopher Linke** took silver with a German record of **2:23:21**, while **Miguel Angel Lopez** set a Spanish record of **2:23:48** in third.

Poland's **Maher Ben Hlima** led early on and went through 20km in 1:21:08, 34 seconds ahead of Stano, who in turn was slightly ahead of Linke and significantly ahead of Lopez. But Stano stormed through to take over, recording 2:00:57 at 30km with a 3:54 lap. That was all he needed to know that a world record was within reach, and he duly delivered when crossing the line in 2:20:43.

Maria Perez survived a toilet break during the women's race to come home first by 36 seconds. The enforced stop did nothing to halt the Spanish double world champion, who broke the world record on this course two years ago with 2:37:15.

This time she had to settle for a world-leading **2:38:59**, but it was more than good enough to head 2021 Olympic 20km champion **Antonella Palmisano**, who was making her debut at the distance.

Even so, the Italian broke her country's national record by more than two minutes and became the seventh woman to better the 2:40 barrier. Palmisano's **2:39:35** was excellent, but Perez was always in control. Italy's **Nicole Colombi** finished third in a PB of **2:41:47** and **Hanna Shevchuk** placed fourth in a Ukrainian record of **2:42:41** to underline a top-class field.

Perez recorded 1:31:45 at 20km, only to need that stop halfway through the 21st lap. But by 25km, she was still 32 seconds clear of anyone else. Palmisano pushed hard over the closing stages, and apart from a silver medal, her reward was to

be handsomely lifted aloft at the finish by the diminutive, yet clearly strong winner.

Paul McGrath followed up two major silvers from 2024 with a superb gold in the men's 20km race. The athlete born in Catalonia to a Scottish father and Spanish mother claimed his first major title with an authority belying his 23 years. He took control at 13km to move away effortlessly away and win in **1:18:08** – just 13 seconds outside his PB, but still a championship record.

In the last 300m, defending champion **Francisco Fortunato** of Italy found an extra sprint to pass a tiring **Gabriel Bordier**, finishing second and third respectively in PBs of **1:18:16** and **1:18:23**. It was the very least the Frenchman deserved after a gutsy performance that saw him lead from the gun to McGrath taking control.

There were personal bests for fourth, fifth and sixth places as well in a sizzling race. **Andre Cosi** came home in **1:18:43**; Ukraine's **Mukola Rushchak** took more than two minutes off his previous best with **1:18:50**, and Spain's **Alvaro Lopez** notched **1:19:48**.

McGrath was second at the European Championships and at last year's World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships. But this time laps in the latter stages averaging 3:50 were all that was needed for top spot.

Ten years after she earned world bronze, **Lyudmila Olynavovska** finally claimed a major title, topping the podium in **1:27:56** after accelerating at 16km to break away from **Clémence Beretta**, who finished in a PB of **1:28:05** – 39 seconds quicker than her previous best. Back-to-back 4:20m laps saw Olynavovska make the race's decisive bid after the pack splintered to three by halfway (44:24); Ukraine's **Mariia Sakharuk** was the surprise third alongside Beretta and Olynavovska.

It was down to just two at 13km as the pace took its toll on Sakharuk. Beretta's plucky effort saw her claim a first major medal of any sort. Behind her, teammate **Pauline Stey** race walked mostly solo to take third in **1:28:18** - another French PB and on their way to the team prize.

Spain's **Antia Chamosa** came through for fourth in **1:29:11**, and 2022 world silver medallist **Katarzyna Zdzieblo's** steady effort was good enough for fifth in **1:29:19**.
