Our standout performances at the weekend both occurred in Adelaide, at last Saturday's ASA Road walk championships. Here, **Sam McCure** and **Sebastian Richards** both recorded thumping PB times to claim this week's WOTW.

Racing as a solo entrant in the U20 10km title, **Sam** made every step count in clocking **42:49** – an improvement by 1:07. Since his move to Adelaide from QLD for uni studies, Sam has thrived under the coaching of Jared Tallent. An accomplished junior walker thanks to all who had charge of his early development, Sam is laying the groundwork for an exceptional senior career. We hope this eventuates for him.

A PB of over 3½ minutes is nearly always a big improvement marker, particularly over 8km. **Sebastian's** journey of progress took a big leap on Saturday, seeing him win the U18 title in **38:42**. In recent

years he has steadily cut down his times and this latest result should be a springboard to further progress over the key 10km distance.

# DOGS OFF LEASH

At our championships day on Sunday 18 May, one of our race judges had cause to lodge a formal report concerning several dogs whose owners had seen fit to let them run untethered in a 'KEEP DOGS ON LEASH' area, very close to the northern turn of our course. At least one dog had been free to roam onto the path itself.

There is official signage on the path next to the Bowling Club fence in that area, requiring that dogs be kept on leash. Whether it was unseen or ignored by the dog owners, it resulted in a safety risk and was a source of anxiety for our competitors.

The incident was reported to Parks Victoria, who will advise their rostered rangers to patrol the area and undertake dog education measures if necessary.

• The article below appeared on the Facebook page, *The Lost History Of Melbourne/Victoria & Its Pioneers*.<sup>1</sup> It appears to have been written by the page's creator, Tony Beyer, a keen chronicler of Australia's cultural heritage. An informative biographical piece on one of Australia's greatest walkers, **Noel Frederick Freeman**.

Puzzlingly, Mr Beyer refers to Noel by his middle name throughout. Perhaps it was published as such at an earlier time and stuck, or was Frederick the name he was known by as a child? Perhaps Bob Gardiner (or Tim Erickson) could enlighten us.

# Frederick the Great? Well, it's Noel, actually ...<sup>2</sup>

He grew up in the working-class suburb of Preston, Victoria — the kind of place where dreams don't come gift-wrapped. Frederick wasn't born with a silver spoon, but somewhere between the cracked sidewalks and the dusty streets, he found something far more valuable: grit. The kind that doesn't flinch when it's tired, doesn't stop when it's hurting, and certainly doesn't back down when the world starts watching.

By the time the 1960 Summer Olympics arrived in Rome, Frederick wasn't just another name on the roster — he was a man chasing history, step by aching step. The 20-kilometre walk is a brutal test of discipline, where technique matters just as much as endurance. And Frederick? He walked that line — literally and metaphorically — all the way to the silver medal. The moment he crossed that finish line, he wasn't just an athlete. He was a symbol of determination wrapped in the green and gold of Australia.

But the Olympics have a cruel sense of irony. In the longer 50-kilometre event, with the Roman sun baking the course and the crowd roaring like a storm, Frederick was with the leaders. The dream was unfolding beautifully — until it wasn't. A

disqualification hit him like a thunderclap. One misjudged stride, and the officials waved the red card. Just like that, hopes of a second medal evaporated into the Roman dust.

Many athletes would've disappeared after a heartbreak like that. But not Frederick.



Four years later, Tokyo. A new city. A new race. Same relentless fire. He returned to the Olympic stage with scars from Rome — not visible ones, but the kind that live quietly behind the eyes. In the 20 km walk, he pushed himself to the brink, finishing

*just off the podium in fourth place. It wasn't gold, silver, or bronze — but it was something else: redemption, of a quieter sort.* 

Then came Edinburgh, 1970. The Commonwealth Games. The air was cooler, but the fire inside him burned just as hot. The event this time? A grueling 20-mile walk. Frederick wasn't a kid anymore — he was a seasoned warrior, carrying years of triumphs and letdowns in his stride. This time, there was no disqualification, no near miss, no heartbreak.

He won.

With Bob Gardiner, another Australian, pressing hard behind him and Scotland's own Bill Sutherland trying to close the gap, Frederick held them off like a man possessed. Each mile, each moment, was a declaration: 'I'm still here. Still walking. Still winning.'

# VRWC Club points results, 24th May – Middle Park

The 36 walkers who arrived at Middle Park on Saturday found another sunny autumn afternoon awaiting, the only downer being a cold, driving nor'easterly that spoiled a few hopes for fast times. It didn't, however, prevent nine PBs from being set, with six coming from the keen-as-mustard 1km field.



The 8, 6 and 4km fields cast their action shadows.

The 8km saw Jade Chitty make her first appearance for the season, ripping a big chunk from her PB in clicking 45:36. John Nottle showed that the Masters ranks can also be fertile ground for best times, demolishing his previous fastest 8k time by over  $2\frac{1}{2}$  minutes for 53:23.

Jordan Galbraith and Ariana Pashutina returned the best 6km times of the day, both going sub-33:00, while Arthur Robinson added another big improvement to his list with a 1:10 PB for 4km. It was pleasing to see two of our new young members, Kobe Lewis, and Aangi Shah, have their first 4km hit-outs and gain valuable endurance experience.

A sizeable field of 10 signed up for the 2km, with **Emily Smith** leading them home in a brisk **10:34**. **Grace Louey** narrowly missed the 11:00 barrier with her **11:03** but managed to hold off a determined finish from **Logan Allison** by 5 secs. **Caitlyn Shipham's** run of PBs had to end eventually, but not before she gave it a good crack and falling short by on 6 seconds. **Anna Dubar** and **Daisy Hooper** had their first go at the distance and came up with promising first results.

No chilly wind could stop the fireworks in the 1km, with Fletcher Reid producing his first sub 5:00 result and brother Ryder joining him in the day's PB circle. Grayson and Avery Allison, along with Ava Pravednikov and Summer Patten, all made huge progress on a tougher day for racing than one might have thought.

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# INTERNATIONAL NEWS



Wednesday of last week marked ten years since the passing of the Italian superstar **Annarita Sidoti**, taken too early at age 45. Giving the lie to any notion that you have to be tall to succeed in walking, the 1.50m tall Sidoti (once referred to by Bruce McAvaney during an Olympics call as 'a tiny little tot', though not disparagingly) got her results with technique, speed, power, flexibility and sheer talent. This is illustrated perfectly in this clip from the 1997 World Championships 10,000m walk in Athens and posted on the Facebook page of *Federazione Italiana di Atletica Leggera*.

Below is a brief review on Olympedia of Sidoti's career, naming the highlights:<sup>3</sup>

Annarita Sidoti was the first great Italian female walker. She won 10 Italian titles, but the highlights of her career were winning the 1997 World Championship, and European Championships in both 1990 and 1998 in the 10 km, adding a silver medal in the 1994 Europeans. She competed at three Olympics (1992-2000), with a best finish of seventh in 1992. Her other major titles included the 1994 European Indoors over 3 km, the 1995 Universiade and 1996 European Cup in the 10 km. Sidoti set six Italian walk records, one each at 5K and 10K, and four in the 20K. Sidoti later became a Councillor for Sports in San Giorgio di Gioiosa Marea and was an actress in one movie, "The Accomplices" by Emanuela Piovano.
