Who else?

On Sunday, **Jemima Montag** produced the finest performance of her career so far, outlasting all but one of her formidable international rivals to take the Silver medal in the Women's 20km at the Budapest World Athletics Championships – the first Australian medal of the meet. In doing so, she set new Commonwealth, Oceania, Australian, Victorian and (of course) VRWC Club records with her final time of **1:27:16** ... also an 11sec PB. Best of all, it won her another WOTW!

Those of us able to watch the race on SBS VICELAND know we were privileged to be seeing something truly special in Australian athletics history – further confirmation of the too often unacknowledged role race walking has played in this country's track & field success. Never had Jemima look so confident, so composed, so in charge of her race against the elite of the sport as she did in Budapest. She was the very model of economy, restraint, endurance (no dropping off the lead pack this time) and timing. One by one, those highly-credentialed rivals fell behind to leave only herself and Maria Perez (ESP), whose long, brutal surge in the last 5km settled who took which of the first two medals.

Jemima's success is the latest in what has been – thanks to the Matildas (football) and Diamonds (netball) an enormous boost for women's sport that we should all want to see thrive and flower into something more enduring. Jemima certainly does. As an IOC Young Leader through her 'Girls Play On' program, she champions the lifelong involvement of girls

and women in sport and physical activity ... the kind of initiative that is sorely needed the world over.

Congratulations, Jemima. What an inspiration you are to us all!

*Honourable mentions

- **Declan Tingay (WA/VIC)** Like Jemima, Dec walked a controlled and disciplined race in the Men's 20km in Budapest, gaining another international top-10 finish with a PB of **1:18:30**.
- **Rhydian Cowley (VIC)** One more international top-15 result for Rhyd, his 20km time of **1:19:31** missed his own PB by a single second but may prove an invaluable depletion step in his build-up for the 35km on Thursday.
- Rebecca Henderson (VIC) Another who will back up for the 35km, Bec walked as tough as always in the 20km while keeping something in reserve, and she will have appreciated the hit-out before Thursday.
- **Kyle Swan (VIC)** and **Olivia Sandery (SA)** Although neither had the results they would have wanted, both have worked just as hard and with as much dedication as their team-mates and they deserved their places out there in the green and gold.
- **John Ronan (WA)** On any other week, John may well have added one more WOTW to his collection with his fantastic 1:36 PB effort of **43:08** for 10km in the WA State Road walk championships.

SILVER SUCCESS AS MONTAG GRABS AUSTRALIA'S FIRST MEDAL IN BUDAPEST

Olympic race walker **Jemima Montag** has claimed Australia's first medal at the 2023 World Athletics Championships in Budapest, walking her way to silver and a national record in the Women's 20km Race Walk at the historic Heroes Square.

Enduring soaring temperatures, 25-year-old **Montag** (VIC, Brent Vallance) made her presence known in the lead group over the first 15 laps of the one-kilometre course. Though eventual winner Maria Perez (Spain) surged to a decisive lead at the 16km mark, winning gold in 1:26:51, the Australian stayed true to her race plan, emphatically crossing the line in 1:27:16.

"I've learned from the last few World Champs and the Olympics that when the move is made at about 15km, it's the winning move. The last three majors I haven't had the training evidence or the selfbelief, or the technical backing to go with it but when speaking to my psych the last few days, the idea was just to be willing to hurt in that last five."

"I didn't really have any intention of challenging her (Perez). And I knew I was on one red card. So it's smarter to lock in silver, and keep that distance back to bronze than to worry about challenging for gold and potentially getting disqualified."

In claiming silver, Montag became the first Australian women's race walker to finish on the podium at the World Athletics Championships since Kerry Saxby-Junna in 1999, while also shaving 11 seconds off her own national record to reaffirm Australia's rich history in global race walking.

Montag's maiden global medal signifies her steep progression since making her World Championships debut in Doha 2019; 10th in Qatar, sixth at the Tokyo Olympics, to fourth at the 2022 World Athletics Championships, and now a silver medallist in 2023.

Olympian **Rebecca Henderson** (VIC, Simon Baker) placed 32nd overall in a time of 1:35:51, while 2022 World Under 20 Championships fourth-place getter **Olivia Sandery** (SA, Jared Tallent) was disqualified after receiving four red cards.

TINGAY FINDS FORM IN BUDAPEST

Olympian Declan Tingay has launched Australia's campaign at the World Athletics Championships in style, walking to his first global Top-8 finish in the Men's 20km Race Walk, while Australia's fastest man Rohan Browning dashed to a date with the 100m Semi-Finals.

In one of the deepest races in the event's history featuring 18 men finishing inside 1:20:00, **Declan Tingay** (WA, Brent Vallance) stamped his authority, placing eighth in a time of 1:18:30. The 24-year-old's time was the fastest by any Australian at a World Athletics Championships, with the 16-second personal best solidifying his position as Australia's second fastest race walker over the distance, behind 2007 world champion Nathan Deakes.

Two hours after the race was originally due to start at the picturesque Hero Square, the field of 50 set off in rain-swept conditions as Tingay led the way for fellow Australians **Rhydian Cowley** (VIC, Brent Vallance) and **Kyle Swan** (VIC, Jared Tallent). Racing prominently throughout proceedings, Tingay fell back to 12th place through 16km, before digging his feet into

the ground to achieve his goal of a Top-8 finish, after crossing the line in 17th at 2022 Oregon World Championships.

"It was carnage out there, but collectively as a team we leant into that carnage and maybe it's one of those quintessential Aussie traits that you do when everyone is panicking," Tingay said.

"I knew it was going to be quick, but I didn't think it would be that quick. We hit half way in 38:50 and that's one of my fastest 10km road times ever. I knew everybody else was hurting around that time so I just leant into that pain and sucked it up. I saw everybody else in front of me start to suffer and that spurs you forward and there is your top-8 finish."

Cowley served up a trademark calculated performance to rapidly progress through the field in the closing stages, finishing in 14th place in 1:19:31 - the fourth fastest time by an Australian at a major championships, and just one second off his personal best. Swan finished in 40th place in a time of 1:26:02.



Martin takes first gold in Budapest with heroic 20km race walk triumph

Alvaro Martin became the first gold medallist at the World Athletics Championships Budapest 23 as he won a stormdelayed men's 20km race walk.

The Spaniard took over from long-time leader **Koki Ikeda** with five kilometres remaining to become the first of this event's Superheroes in Heroes Square.

The 29-year-old from Llerena, who missed an Olympic medal in this event by one place at the Tokyo Games, claimed his first global title in rain-swept conditions with a perfectly judged race that saw him come home in a world-leading 1:17:32. Also judging his race superbly was **Perseus Karlstrom**, who won world bronze at 20km and 35km in Oregon last year and who earned a place one step higher on the podium with a Swedish record of 1:17:39, with bronze going to Brazil's Caio **Bonfim**, who also set a national record of 1:17:47.

Canada's Evan Dunfee, who earned bronze at the last men's 50km race walk events to be held at the Olympics and World Championships, demonstrated how effectively he has switched his racing focus by finishing with the strength you might have expected to finish fourth in a national record of 1:18:03.

Martin, who won the 2018 European title and finished seventh in this event at last year's World Championships, recalled his Olympic frustration in his moment of victory.

- "I was fourth at the last Olympics Games, I missed the bronze which motivated me to work hard," he said.
- "In Tokyo, I felt when I was in the fourth position that I could win a medal. Unfortunately, it did not happen and that is why this gold medal is next step towards the next Olympic Games.
- "I had an amazing race today, I did not expect to finish this fast, it is amazing. I cannot express all my feelings right now, it feels like a dream.
 - "I have one of the best coaches in the world, Jose Antonio Carillo, who is one of the best race walkers in history.
- "I watched previous championships where Miguel Angel Lopez won and I cried a lot, I was really happy for him. I did the same now. I am really happy and I do not have words to express it.

"Huge thanks goes to my coach and my girlfriend, this is a medal for the team. Actually, my whole family came to support me. The next goal is the gold at the Olympic Games but the only thing I want to do now is to cry out of happiness. I am going to enjoy this moment."

Toshikazu Yamanishi, seeking a third consecutive title having beaten Ikeda to gold in Oregon last year, had no success today as he dropped out of contention before the halfway point and finished 24th in **1:21:39.**

There was disappointment too for Italy's Olympic champion **Massimo Stano**, who never figured in the leading contenders and failed to finish the race, as did Ireland's **David Kenny**, with Lithuania's **Marius Ziukas** being the sole athlete disqualified.

National records were also set by the fifth and sixth-place finishers Christopher Linke of Germany, who clocked 1:18:12, and Veli-Matti Partanan of Finland, who recorded 1:18:22.

The next two finishers – **Brian Pintado** of Ecuador and Australia's **Declan Tingay** – set personal bests of **1:18:26** and **1:18:30** respectively.

It was one of the deepest races in history – and the best ever at a major championships – as a record 18 men finished inside 1:20. For the first time ever at a global championships, three men finished inside 1:18 and 10 men finished inside 1:19.

These results on the one-kilometre looped course along Andrassy Avenue in the city centre were all the more remarkable given the weather. While the ferocity of the initial storm which caused a two-hour delay to the event had abated, competitors still got underway in driving rain which had barely stopped before the event concluded.

Ikeda, Japan's 25-year-old world and Olympic silver medallist, took off early on a lone quest that looked increasingly viable until he began to fade in the second half of the race. But after Turkey's **Salih Korkmaz** had helped bridge the gap – before paying the price for his efforts – the brave contender dropped rapidly down to finish 15th in **1:19:44** - one place ahead of Korkmaz, who clocked **1:19:49**.

Two hours after the race was originally due to have started the athletes set off in heavy rain and Brazil's Caio Bonfim made the early pace before the red shirt of Ikeda made its way to the front as the field moved along the puddle-strewn, gleaming road surface.

Ikeda, with peaked cap pulled down over his brow, looked like a man on a mission as his efforts at the front began to string out the field. At the 4km mark he held a four-second lead over a main group in which his colleague Yamanishi was prominent.

By 5km that lead had increased to eight seconds as he passed in 19:18, with Yamanishi, Martin, Korkmaz and Pintado grouped behind him. At 6km Ikeda's lead was 10 seconds.

The hatless Turkish athlete, hair plastered across his forehead, was making the most obvious efforts to bridge the gap, although just at his shoulder Yamanishi looked calm and collected, while Stano remained in the middle of the pack. But still Ikeda pushed on as the rain reduced to a drizzle, extending his lead over the Turk to 16 seconds after 9km – the high point of his race.

As he approached the halfway point, Ikeda lapped his first athlete, moving past the labouring figure of Finland's Jerry Jokinen, who briefly became a graphic counterpoint to the fine-tuned sharpness of the leader.

Ikeda hit the 10km mark in 38:37, with Korkmaz and Bonfim passing the same point 15 seconds later. The main pursuing group of nine athletes was six seconds further back, led by Sweden's hugely consistent Karlstrom, the world ranked No.1. The chasing group contained the Chinese race walker who went into the race as the world leader, Zhang Jun, but he was dropping back. Yamanishi was also dropping back; at 11km he was almost a minute adrift of the man he beat to the world title last year.

Meanwhile, Dunfee was moving up and Korkmaz, now accompanied by Bonfim, was beginning to make some progress in his chasing quest, cutting the lead to 11 seconds by the 12km marker.

By the 14km point the lead was down to seven seconds as Bonfim began to bridge the gap in a serious way, with Korkmaz a couple of seconds adrift.

With five kilometres remaining, however, the shape of the race altered decisively as Martin surged forwards to take a marginal lead over the flagging Japanese racer, with Bonfim just three seconds behind.

Korkmaz, exhausted by his efforts, was dropping back fast in seventh place as Karlstrom and Dunfee – hardened racers both – moved past him into medal contention.

Also in the hunt was Kenya's Samuel Gathimba, who finished fourth over 20km in Oregon last year, just missing the distinction of becoming Africa's first race walking world medallist. Gathimba, however, eventually finished ninth here in 1:18:34.

By 17km Martin had forged an eight-second lead over Bonfim, while Karlstrom had moved through into a position to add another world bronze to his collection, just two seconds behind the Brazilian and nine seconds clear of Dunfee. The effort was showing in Bonfim's face as he strove to keep the Spaniard in range, but with two kilometres the powerful figure of Karlstrom was at his shoulder and past him.

There was a historic performance further down the field, as Portugal's 47-year-old **Joao Vieira**, making his 13th World Athletics Championship appearance – equalling the record held by Spanish race walker Jesus Angel Garcia – finished an honourable 33rd of the 47 finishers in **1:23:37**.

Perez completes Spanish 20km race walk double in Budapest

For the second time in less than 24 hours, Heroes' Square belonged to Spain.

Following in the lightning-quick footsteps of Alvaro Martin in the lightning-delayed men's 20km race walk the day before, **Maria Perez** completed a golden Spanish double in the women's event at the start of day two at the World Athletics Championships Budapest 23.

The prevailing conditions were markedly different, bright sunshine glinting off the sandstone structures lining the one-kilometre course, but the tactics were just the same. Tellingly so.

Like Martin before her, Perez kept her powder dry before putting the hammer down in the final 5km, the pocket rocket from the Spanish city of Granada breaking her rivals with successive splits of 4:06, 4:09, 40:05 and 4:06 before easing off with a 4:21 lap as she collected a Spanish flag from her coach, Jacinto Garzon, in the finishing straight.

The 27-year-old crossed the line in 1:26:51 – 25 seconds clear of her closest pursuer, the inspired two-time Commonwealth champion **Jemima Montag**, who upheld Australia's fine race walk tradition with a silver medal in 1:27:16, an Oceania record.

Ten seconds farther back, **Antonella Palmisano**, the Olympic champion from Italy, returned from injury to claim bronze in **1:27:26** – despite a potentially damaging mid-race fall.

For Perez, it was sweet redemption following the disqualification she suffered at last year's World Championships in Oregon – and continuation of the golden streak of form that took her to the 35km world record in May.

In Berlin back in 2018 she became European champion. In Budapest, five years on, she was on top of the world.

"I cannot put into the words how important it is to me to win this first global gold, especially at the 20km," the Andalucian said. "Victory at this distance was my main goal for Budapest. Last night I felt so nervous I couldn't sleep.

"I was forced to call our doctor for some help with medicines that could help sleep before the event. Thank God, it helped and I felt more or less fresh this morning.

"I had to give my maximum. I got a hamstring cramp, but I continued to work at 100%. Now I need a medical examination from our doctors to see whether it will be possible for me to compete in the 35km on Thursday.

"Maybe it will be better to start a fast recovery as the next year is an Olympic one and I would like to stay healthy to prepare for Paris on the highest level."

For Montag, the silver medal was huge reward for the graft she has done under the direction of coach Brent Vallance while studying for a degree in biomedical science at the University of Melbourne and acting as an IOC youth leader.

The Victorian became her country's first medallist in the event since the bronze won by Kerry Saxby-Juna in the inaugural women's 20km in Seville in 1999 and the fourth Australian race walker to make the World Championships podium – after Saxby-Juna, who also took 10km bronze in 1987, 2007 men's 50km champion Nathan Deakes and three-time 50km silver medallist Jarred Talent.

"It's unreal," said Montag, who came close to hitting the global medal standard with sixth place in the Olympic 20km race walk in 2021 and fourth at last year's World Championships in Oregon. "This was like a special celebration with my family who came along and I'm happy to see all of my training partners too.

"This season we built my training so that we could have the opportunity to get a medal here. I believed but I did not expect too much from myself because I needed to focus on my technique and the process.

"This year I've really worked hard on my mind. I wear a bracelet from my grandmother, who survived the Holocaust. I think that she is on my arm during the race.

"I wanted to pay a tribute to her – to thank her for the opportunity that I can be here."

As for Palmisano, she was not so content with her bronze. "This was a very difficult fast race," the Italian team captain reflected. "It was just not in me today. I didn't have it in my legs."

It was **Yang Jiayu** who had the legs at the start, China's 2017 world champion blasting through the opening kilometre in 4:24.

Kimberly Garcia, the Peruvian who made history in Oregon as the first women's double race walk winner, then moved to the front and put her foot on the gas, drawing a pack of nine clear of the field as she powered through 2km in 8:44. By 3km, the gap was up to nine seconds, with double European champion **Antigoni Ntrismpioti** of Greece leading the pursuers.

At the front, Garcia upped the pace with a 4:19 lap, whittling the lead group to seven women: the Peruvian, plus Yang, Perez, Palmisano, Montag, Mexican **Alegna Gonzalez** and **Ma Zhenxia** of China, winner of the 20km at the World Race Walking Team Championships last year.

The septet – featuring athletes from five different continents – reached 5km in a brisk 21:44. At that point, they held a lead of 14 seconds on eighth-placed Peruvian **Evelyn Inga**.

The pace dropped from 4:20 laps to 4:23s as the leaders hit halfway in 43:43, registering a 5km split of 21:59. That allowed South American champion **Glenda Morejon** of Ecuador to close the huge gap, making it an eight-woman battle at the front.

Negotiating a tight turn, Palmisano rolled an ankle and slipped to the floor, losing a couple of seconds before steadily regaining contact – indeed, getting back into her groove sufficiently to take over at the front at 13km. Thereafter, the lead seesawed, Perez pointedly sitting back, content to allow her rivals to take the load.

The pace slowed with a 22:21 third 5km split, before Perez pounced at the 15km point, putting the hammer down with a 4:06 split that splintered the lead pack. Following up with laps of 4:09 and then 4:05 – the fastest of the race – she stretched out her advantage to a decisive 14 seconds with just 2km remaining.

By the finish, the gap had grown to 25 seconds and Spain joined the US at the top of the gold medal stakes with two each. Garcia finished strongly but was still six seconds shy of the podium with 1:27:32 in fourth, followed home by Mexican Alegna Gonzalez, fifth in 1:27:36, and Morejon, sixth in 1:27:40.

With sixth women finishing inside 1:28 and 10 women finishing inside 1:29, it was the highest ever quality race at the World Championships.
