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#### \*\*WALKER OF THE WEEK \*\*



Last Thursday in Budapest, **Allanah Pitcher** (NSW) and **Rhydian Cowley** (VIC) carried Australia's colours and hopes in the WA 35km championship (injury having, sadly, forced Bec Henderson to withdraw.) While the Spaniards were making history up ahead, Allanah and Rhyd were giving everything they had in their own battles with the torrid conditions at Heroes Square, to advance the green and gold as far as they could.

Tossed into the pressure cooker in her first international championship, 19yo **Allanah** showed she was more than up to the task, placing an admirable 21<sup>st</sup> in 2:57:55. Clearly suited as she is to the rigors of distance walking, it's a disgrace that such races have now been cut from under Allanah and others like her, at least for the present. Nevertheless, this debut was an excellent performance and earns her an obvious WOTW.



Ordinarily, a DNF would not be considered for this award but ... **Rhydian**? Ordinary? Forget it. I haven't seen every race he's done overseas, by any means, but it's a safe bet that Rhydian Cowley hasn't worn an Australian vest at any time without going all out, all the way, in it. And his Budapest campaign was no exception.

Having pushed himself over the top in the 20km to finish 14<sup>th</sup>, a bare second shy of his PB, Rhydian set about the rapid glycogen restock essential to be competitive in the 35km five days later. And for 20km he was right up there with the lead pack, falling back only gradually as they accelerated. In the end, his wrung-out body simply gave way, sending him tumbling to the tarmac not once, but twice (25km and 27km). He gave until he was empty – he was reportedly quite unwell at the time. Nobody could, or should, expect as much of an athlete, and most couldn't give it. But again, Rhydian isn't like most. He commits all the way. He did here ... and he shares this week's WOTW with Allanah. We're proud of them both.

#### VRWC AV Country & VRWC road c'ships, 27 August - Ballarat



Nothing like a 10k to get the blood racing on a Ballarat morning ...

A chilly Ballarat Sunday morning usually needs only a little sunshine to warm the cockles, and so it proved this time for the 22 walkers, club officials and supporters who fronted at Victoria Park for the annual Country championships. Despite some hasty course re-measurement and negotiation with the local dog training group for access to their toilet block (after the one the local council allocated to us was found to be out of commission), the races began on time – all credit to Kerrie Peart and family for their efforts in making it happen.

As was predictable, numbers were low on the country side, and planning to boost participation in the sport in Victoria has to include strategies for increasing involvement in the rural areas. The Ballarat Race Walking Club has been keeping the boat afloat pretty much on its own for several years; since Covid it has been the only regular competition centre, and it's time to promote the sport in other parts of the state, particularly in the burgeoning Little Athletics communities. There must surely be dozens, if not hundreds, of youngsters out there who'd present as race walking 'naturals' if given the chance, and many more who'd do it because they enjoy it.

Down as the figures were on Sunday, competitive racing was still seen in the 10km and 5km especially. **Marcus Wakim**, competing by invitation, stepped on the gas from the gun to take line honours in a rapid **43:08**, while behind him **Fraser Saunder** and Tassie guest **Will Bottle** had a good duel before Fraser broke away to clock **45:36** to **46:18**. The Women's Country title was taken by **Megan Szirom** who gradually overhauled **Jemma Peart**. Jemma had an earlier duel with invitational winner **Arnika Nelson** whose **51:46** was a 37sec PB. Evergreen **Sarah Brennan** took the bronze with her usual consistent effort, clocking **57:00**.

Scott Peart kept on terms with Riley Coughlan for most of the 5km, taking the Country U20 title with 22:34 behind Riley's VRWC U18-winning 22:09. Unfortunately, Matilda Read had no opposition to help her walk faster in the U14 3km, which yielded her the gold at least in 17:29.

**HUNGARY:** WA World Athletics c'ships 35km Walk, 24 August - Budapest

#### Martin completes race walk double for Spain in Budapest

Spain's **Alvaro Martin**, winner of the men's 20km race walk on the opening day of the **World Athletics Championships Budapest 23**, completed a golden double here as he proved to be a hero again in Heroes Square by claiming the men's 35km title.

The 29-year-old from Llerena, whose victory in the shorter race was his first global success following European 20km wins in 2018 and 2022, waited until the final kilometre before moving past Ecuador's **Brian Pintado** to establish a swift and decisive lead, finishing in a national record of **2:24:30**.

It was the first part of a Spanish 'double double' as, shortly afterwards, his teamate **Maria Perez**, winner of the women's 20km race, added a second gold over 35km.

"I am so tired," said Martin after completing a race that had begun at 7am to mitigate the effects of the current heatwave here.

"I was fourth in the Olympic Games and it was very tough to get so close to an Olympic medal, so it's wonderful now to be a double world champion in Budapest. I see Maria is first too in the women's race, so today is a great day for Spain."

The midway part of the race featured a lone breakaway by France's **Aurelien Quinion**, 14th in this event at last year's World Championships, who stretched his lead to 37 seconds by the 23km mark before the field moved back to him inexorably.

Under pressure, Quinion began to accrue red cards for loss of contact, and his challenge effectively ended shortly after his lead had been reduced to nine seconds at the 29km mark as he received a third red card, meaning he had to sit out of the race for a penalty of three minutes and 30 seconds.

Upon resumption, a fourth red card triggered his disqualification – something he also experienced at last year's European Championships in Munich.

Pintado, clearly struggling with the intense conditions, held on to take silver in a South American record of **2:24:34**. Bronze went to Japan's **Masatora Kawano**, silver medallist in this event at last year's World Championships, who finished in **2:25:12** after managing to keep at bay the challenge of Canada's **Evan Dunfee**, who placed fourth – just as he had in the 20km race – in **2:25:28**.

Germany's **Christopher Linke**, always involved in the leading group, was fifth in a national record of **2:25:35**, with Japan's **Tomohiro Noda** sixth in **2:25:50** and Italy's defending champion **Massimo Stano**, who faded during the closing stages, seventh in **2:25:59**.

**Perseus Karlstrom** of Sweden, seeking to add to the 20km silver he won on Saturday, figured only briefly in the lead group before finishing eighth in **2:27:03**.

China's **He Xianghong**, fifth in Oregon last year in a national record of 2:24:45, and an Asian record breaker with 2:22:55 earlier this year, also slipped from the lead group in the final kilometres, finishing 23rd in **2:37:21**.

Spain's European champion **Miguel Angel Lopez** had led the men through 5km in 20:39, with Stano, Martin and He at his shoulder. Already the sun was beginning to become uncomfortably hot and drinks were being imbibed and doused on heads and shoulders.

By 10km, Karlstrom had moved up to take the lead, passing in 41:33 with He, Martin, Lopez and Stano just behind, and Linke, Dunfee, Noda two seconds further back.

Dunfee, repurposing himself as a shorter distance athlete having earned bronze at the Tokyo Olympic Games in the last 50km race walk to be staged at the Games, then moved up to get the feel of the lead, taking the pack through 12km in 49:56. But the race burst into life shortly after this point as Quinion, who had been two seconds back at 13km, surged to the front and established a five-second lead a kilometre later.

By 15km the French racer's lead had extended to 12 seconds, and a kilometre on it was 13 seconds as the main group of favourites withheld from making any big effort to catch him.

The decision was becoming more acute by the 16km mark as Ouinion extended his lead to 20 seconds.

As the race entered the second half, Quinion, with peaked cap pulled low over his brow and a white cooling towel draped around his neck, was continuing to push, and his lead at the 18km point was 26 seconds from Dunfee at the head of the chasing group of about a dozen.

The Frenchman was going for broke – at 21km his lead was 28 seconds; at 22km he was 36 seconds clear; at 23km he was 37 seconds clear, with Ecuador's Pintado now taking up the chase in earnest, with Stano, Noda, Martin, Kawano, Bonfim, Dunfee and Linke in close attendance.

The tide began to turn, however, as Dunfee took up the pace again, reducing the lead to 33 seconds by the 22km marker, and with 10km remaining that margin remained, with Stano, Martin, Lopez and Dunfee all in earnest in a chasing group of seven.

Soon Quinion began to hear the sound of reeling as the pack moved up on him. His 22 seconds lead at the 28km mark had been reduced to nine seconds at 29km, and, critically, the Frenchman, under pressure, had begun to pick up red cards before making a penalty pit-stop.

Martin responded most smartly, taking a seven-second lead at the 30km mark from Dunfee, with Linke and Noda eight seconds back.

But Pintado had not finished yet, moving back into the lead at 31km, marginally ahead of Martin and Noda as Dunfee dropped back into fourth place, 12 seconds adrift.

As the field approached the 33km marker, Martin – with the sun becoming intense – was drafting the Ecuadorian, with Kawano struggling to hold on to bronze with Dunfee still in the hunt and finishing strongly.

But as the race entered the final kilometre, Martin flicked the switch and made his decisive move – and there was nothing Pintado could do about it.

"In the last kilometre I had to push hard because I was so tired and Pintado was so close," said Martin. "It was a tougher race today than Saturday and this medal was more difficult to win. But in the end it is an amazing day for Spanish sport because we made history with four gold medals.

"It is a great day for my nation and a great day for my career. Right now I am flying, I am in the clouds. After being fourth in Tokyo, I kept training, and now I am sky-high. I only want to enjoy these amazing days. Of course, the Olympics is the ultimate goal because it is the pinnacle of a career. So I am going to train hard, and fight for it, and dream of it. But now I want to enjoy this historic day."

Pintado said: "The race today was very strategic. I planned to stay behind and surprise them on the last lap but I was missing a few seconds in the end."

Stano commented: "I had a good race. It was a great struggle for everybody. I'm in good shape, but I only finished seventh. I used all the energy in my body and in my mind too. I hope I will do better in the Olympic Games next year."

Dunfee, 32, commented: "I felt pretty good after the 20km but I am getting older! My hamstring was really bugging me today and my physio did an amazing job to get it as good as we could. It felt good for most of the race, then at 32km it just went pop. I thought I was done. I didn't even know if I was going to finish. Somehow it calmed down enough to let me finish, but I couldn't make it back up.

"To finish fourth again is absolutely heartbreaking. In the 20km it was breakthrough race. I was disappointed with my position but proud of how I raced. This one, I wanted to go medal or broke. And I guess I broke."

# Perez breaks 35km championship record to complete golden race walk double in Budapest

Spain's **Maria Perez** completed a golden double here as she added the women's 35km race walk title to the 20km gold she won on Sunday, finishing in a championship record of **2:38:40**, more than two minutes clear of Peru's defending champion **Kimberly Garcia**, whose world double in Oregon last year has now been matched by Perez.

The achievement of the world record-holder completed a 'double double' for Spain shortly after compatriot Alvaro Martin had done the same in the men's competition.

Garcia clocked **2:40:52**, with Greece's **Antigoni Ntrismpioti** claiming bronze in **2:43:22**, one place ahead of **Viviane Lyra**, who set a Brazilian record of **2:44:40**.

Garcia had finished fourth in Sunday's 20km race walk, but her prospects were stronger over the longer distance.

Having set a South American record of 2:39:16 in Oregon, she improved on that with a world record of 2:37:44 in March this year.

Two months later, however, Perez took 29 seconds off that mark with her 2:37:15 victory in Podebrady, and in their only pre-championships meeting this year, over 20km, Garcia came out on top.

But Perez arrived in Budapest undefeated at 35km in all four of her career races – and there was never a moment when a fifth victory looked seriously under threat.

"I never could have thought it was possible to win two golds," said Perez. "It was just too hard. But the hard work and pain paid off.

"I had a problem with my hamstring after the 20km and I was still considering whether to start at the 35km but I managed to get through.

"I felt confident about my technique today and wanted to maintain a normal rhythm throughout the race and not to damage my hamstring any more, so I really did the last 4-5km easy.

"This is a huge achievement, not only for me but for the whole Spanish team. I want to enjoy this moment. I could hear the people around the course screaming my name, cheering for me. That helped me too, especially towards the end.

"The special part of this event was racing together with men. The race walk deserves to have the longer distances. This is a great demonstration for everybody - for the fans, too, the course was full of fans - that in the future we can have a long distances, not just the short ones."

With the women's and the men's races being held together, Perez was the 26th athlete overall to cross the finish line.

"These championships have not been as good as I expected," said Garcia. "I wanted to defend my titles from Eugene over both race walk events. I was really upset with fourth place in the 20km but I had to calm down and recover to be ready for this race. It was not an easy competition.

"The pace was fast and I just did my best. Unfortunately, it was not enough for gold. To win a medal is always good, but I am not that happy with the silver over 35km. It looks like I will not have the ability to take revenge over this distance at the Olympic Games in Paris.

"Race walk events are going to be changed next year. It will be only 20km and team relay. That is why I am going to change my focus from long endurance training to shorter and faster."

Ntrismpioti added: "I cried when I went through the finish line because, although I didn't achieve my best result, this is a great day for me. This is why I get up so early every morning. At home I work for our family restaurant but it's closed now because my mom is here to support me. So I would like to say thank you to my whole family. Finally I got a medal for them, and of course for myself."

Poland's **Katarzyna Zdzieblo**, a double silver medallist at last year's World Championships, began with ambitions intensified by her disqualification from Sunday's 20km race for loss of contact.

At the 5km mark she led a lead group of eight women through in 23:39, with China's **Qieyang Shijie** – who failed to finish a race that had started at 7am to mitigate against the current heatwave – Garcia and Lyra in close attendance.

At the 10km point, five racers had moved clear – Qieyang led through in 46:44 with Perez, Zdzieblo, Ntrismpioti and Garcia Leon in the group.

Zdzieblo continued to push on, taking the lead group through 12km in 55:52, with Japan's **Serena Sonoda** and Lyra 20 seconds back and the main chasing group more than a minute further back.

Shortly after the halfway mark, the Pole led the lead group through 18km in 1:23.33, with Qieyang, Ntrismpioti, Perez and Garcia all stretched out by a stride or two. The next challenger, Sonoda, was 39 seconds back.

At this point the Pole increased the pace and attempted to move clear, creating a three-second margin after 19km. But her bid was swiftly covered by Perez, who in turn moved ahead, with Garcia Leon passing the Pole in an attempt to cover the Spaniard.

By 20km, Perez led, with Garcia three seconds back, Zdzieblo four seconds behind and Ntrismpioti and Qieyang a further two seconds in arrears.

A kilometre further on, Garcia had moved up to be within a second of the leader with Qieyang eight seconds adrift in bronze medal position, with Ntrismpioti and the flagging Pole a second behind her.

But Perez was not to be checked as she pushed on again to put significant distance between herself and her Peruvian pursuer.

At 23km the race appeared to have clarified itself as Perez powered on towards a double, seven seconds clear of Garcia, who was herself 19 seconds clear of Oievang and Ntrismpioti, with Zdzieblo slipping back.

With 10km remaining, Perez had a second gold clearly in sight as her lead over Garcia increased to 24 seconds, with Ntismpioti almost a minute behind the leader, 12 seconds clear of Qieyang.

At 30km the lead gap was almost two minutes ahead of Garcia and more than three minutes ahead of Ntrismpioti. The medals were effectively decided.
