Two-time Olympian and VRWC member **Rhydian Cowley** is one of over 100 athletes who have turned their focus to a range of charity initiatives and sought funding from the '*Athletes For Good*' program in order to pursue their work in these fields. Of those athletes, Rhydian is one of just 20 who've been successful so far.

P&G AWARDS LATEST 'ATHLETES FOR GOOD' CHARITABLE GRANTS AHEAD OF PARIS 2024¹

A joint initiative from the IOC, IPC and Worldwide Olympic Partner P&G, the 'Athletes for Good' programme champions Olympic and Paralympic athletes from around the globe and the charitable causes important to them.

Ahead of the Olympic and Paralympic Games Paris 2024, Worldwide Olympic and Paralympic Partner P&G has chosen 20 athletes who will be honoured in the latest edition of the Athletes for Good programme, which awards grants worth USD 24,000 to charitable organisations supported by each athlete.

As the world counts down to the Games, these athletes from around the globe are not only dedicating themselves to training and preparation for one of the most meaningful events of their careers – their pursuit of greatness also extends beyond the field of play and out into their communities as they champion the causes they care about.

More than 100 athletes from around the world applied for grant funding through the Athletes for Good programme for Paris 2024, with the 20 recipients being selected based on several criteria, including their passion for and personal impact on their chosen charity partner.

The recipients represent 11 different nationalities across 12 sports, including Olympic and Paralympic medallists, elite athletes, and Paris hopefuls, with each of their chosen charity partners receiving a USD 24,000 grant.

Recipients include US surfer **Griffin Colapinto**, who started supporting *To Write Love on Her Arms (TWLOHA)* – a non-profit that supports young people struggling with depression, addiction, suicidal ideation and self-injury – after dealing with his own mental health issues. The grant will provide 96 high schools with TWLOHA's week-long mental health curriculum.

Three-time Olympian representing Great Britain in athletics, **Eilish McColgan** will also receive a grant after founding *Giving Back to Track* – a non-profit that provides support to young people to alleviate the financial burdens of competing in athletics. The grant will enable the expansion of its free after-school clubs and start a fund to source trainers for deserving athletes.

The recipients also include Italian Paralympic swimmer **Carlotta Gilli**, who joined forces with *ToSwim*, whose mission to enhance swimming accessibility for the underserved and people with disabilities inspired her to become an ambassador for the company in 2019. *ToSwim* is an integrated SuperApp that digitises the world of swimming and creates a new experience for all swimmers by involving them in a community where they can communicate, inform, play, compete and become active fans in competitions and aquatic events. The grant will allow ToSwim to install LED systems – which induce stimulation through sensory channels and facilitate the psychological, psychotherapeutic, and rehabilitative well-being of people with physical and or mental disabilities – in six pools, impacting 600 people per week, per pool.

To highlight the philanthropic efforts of their chosen charity partners, P&G will tell the stories of the Athletes for Good recipients in the lead-up to Paris 2024 in local markets around the world through brand partnerships, social media and retail partner activations.

The 'Athletes for Good' programme is helping athletes give back in their communities around the world.

- Charity: Bush Heritage Australia
- Story:

Following the Black Summer Bushfires in Australia in 2019 and 2020, Rhydian Cowley became motivated to get more involved in protecting his country's land. At that time, he started collaborating with Bush Heritage Australia, a leading conservation organization that protects ecosystems and wildlife across the continent. They use the best science, conservation and rightway knowledge to deliver landscape-scale impact while working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and the agricultural sector to ensure their impact is deep, sustainable and collaborative.

Rhydian is an employee of Bush Heritage Australia, working in the 'Gifts in Wills' team to help fundraise for its conservation activities, and he is a member of the organization's 'Green Team', which aims to reduce the environmental impact of the organization's activities.

• *How the AFG grant will support the charity:*

The grant will allow Bush Heritage Australia to support on-the-ground conservation work at one of their 42 reserves or fund their partnership work with Indigenous ranger groups.

Congratulations to Rhydian on securing this substantial grant for a project that – especially given Australia's vulnerability to the extremes of an *El Nino* climatic cycle – is of increasingly vital importance.

At my request, Rhydian has graciously provided a brief explanation of what motivated him to engage with this particular initiative:

Climate change is already making extreme heat much more likely at summer Championships (and during our own domestic summer seasons) - Budapest's heatwave during August's World Championships being the most recent example.

Having had some extra time to sit and think during the Covid lockdown in 2020, and straight off the back of Australia's Black Summer fires and the disruption of trying to train through toxic levels of smoke, I decided I needed to actively put more time and energy into my response to climate change, and more broadly into demonstrating and living my values - knowing that as an Olympian I am privileged to be a role model in the community, and so in a position to lead by example.

One of those ways to live my values was to financially support organisations working in conservation, of which Bush Heritage Australia was one. Through a network of reserves and partnerships around Australia, they work to protect and restore the health of over 11 million hectares of land. At the end of 2022, I was also lucky enough to land a job at Bush Heritage, helping on the fundraising administration side, and occasionally getting to join guided reserve visits to see the work on the ground first hand. I hope that this grant will contribute towards a project on one of Bush Heritage's reserves.

Other ways I am active include joining local litter clean-ups, volunteering at my local community garden, writing to my local council and MP's, and being a part of a local climate action group.

CHINA: 19th Asian Games, 29 September - Hangzhou

China dominate men's, women's 20km race walk at Hangzhou Asiad

HANGZHOU, Sept. 29 (Xinhua) -- China swept both gold and silver medals in the 20km race walk at the Asian Games here on Friday, with **Zhang Jun** and **Wang Zhaozhao** finishing first and second respectively in the men's event, and **Yang Jiayu** defending her title in the women's race followed by **Ma Zhenxia**.

The victories from Zhang and Yang mark China's fifth consecutive win in the men's event and the sixth gold in a row in the women's race at the Asian Games.

Zhang, the second fastest men's 20km race walker this season, broke away from Wang with 4km left to win his first-ever major title in **1:23:00**.

Wang finished second in 1:24:08, followed by newly-crowned Asian champion **Yutaro Murayama** of Japan in **1:24:41**. Zhang's finishing time was 13 seconds faster than his result at last month's World Championships in Budapest, where Chinese race walkers failed to secure any medals.

"I've learned a lot from Budapest and have trained hard in the past month," said Zhang. "Today I just stuck to my plan, saving my energy in the first 15km and accelerating in the final 5km," he added.

The women's event saw a showdown between world record holder Yang and Youth Olympic champion Ma. The duo led the whole race and pushed themselves forward with 5km to go. At the last refreshment station, one of Yang's shoes became loose, forcing her to an unexpected halt.

"For a moment I was thinking about just walking on like that, but then I realized I couldn't speed up in the final phase with my shoe problem, so I stopped to fix it and then caught up with Ma," Yang recalled after the race.

The pair were neck and neck until the final meters of the race. Ma overtook Yang with 10m to go, but the defending champion made a miraculous comeback just before the line, clocking 1:30:03 to seize the gold.

"To be honest I haven't been in good form since Budapest. I was even unable to complete the training plan a week before the Asiad. Today's weather is hot and humid, which also created more difficulties," said Yang, attributing her victory to her mental strength and her execution of the race.

Ma settled for silver, just one second behind Yang. The 25-year-old was the highest-ranked Chinese race walker at the World Championships in Budapest, finishing seventh in the women's 20km event.

The bronze medal went to Japan's Nanako Fujii, who finished in 1:33:49.

In the 10k, Hungarian **Norbert Toth** beat his U23 national record with a strong **40:39**. Remco De Bruin beat his national M55 record.

In the 20k, Michele Antonelli produced a strong 1:22:57.

UNITED KINGDOM: Ryan Cup match (Police v. Civil Service), 27 September - Birmingham

Ron Wallwork has forwarded the latest results from the traditional walking contest between Police and Civil Service. Race walking contests between various professions have a long tradition in British sport. Not surprisingly, the Postal services regularly featured and attracted large fields, as did the London Stock Exchange (who even had their own London-Brighton race!)

The following report and results were compiled by Glyn Jones of the UK Police:

The British Police Championship and the Civil Service Championship and Ryan Cup Match (Police v CS) went ahead yesterday on the established lap course of the perimeter path in Cannonhill Park, Edgbaston, Birmingham. Entries were not large by any standards but the regular stalwarts and officials were present to make it happen once again.

This year the Police won the Ryan Cup. It maybe a fitting finale as the Police Sports Club from where it is held is being transformed into a Public Order training facility as from November this year. Hence it will no longer be a Sports Club building and facilities to hold a similar fixture will probably not be available. In view of this development I did advise everyone at the presentation that we (PSUK and Civil Service) should be looking for a new venue if this historic fixture is to continue next year.
