 Meanwhile, Paul Moritz has supplied his own fond recollection of the part the late Arthur Jones played in his athletic life:

Sad news in H&T about Arthur Jones.

Arthur was my coach when I took up walking in about 1979. Certainly, by 1980 a small group of us would meet at Arthur's place for a 10 km session on a Tuesday evening, around the hills of Adelaide's eastern suburbs, and I continued well into the 1980's when I returned from Melbourne. The group included John Leydon and Liz Morgan (who competed at some LBG carnivals in the 1970's). We were all members of United Collegians, whose uniform featured a red singlet. Arthur lived in Harrow Ave, so he dubbed our group the Red 'Arrows, dropping the H with his English accent.

Bob Gardiner wrote of the Mexico Olympics "when the team went up to a higher altitude to train Arthur bowed out and did an easier session at the village track." Arthur was very pleased to note that he was the first finisher in the Mexico City 20 km who had <u>not</u> trained at altitude. He also claimed to have secured 11th place with a lunge finish ahead of Pasquale Busca of Italy. The photo accompanying the article perhaps contradicts that <sup>1</sup>

Also little known about Arthur is that he is the father-in-law of Ian Fay, a SA walker who represented Australia in the 1980's. Ian married Nicola, Arthur's and Carol's elder daughter. **Paul.**

## \*\* WALKER OF THE WEEK \*\*

Two extraordinary performances – by Isaac Beacroft (16, NSW) and Bailey Housden (16, QLD) - at the ANSW 10,000m track walk championships last weekend locked in this issue's WOTW for both boys. Racing in the championship as part of the Treloar Shield interclub program, Isaac and Bailey gave those fortunate enough to witness it a memorable display of speed and endurance that shattered the national U18 record and placed then at 1 and 2 on the World Athletics U18 top list for 2023 (pushing Victoria's Marcus Wakim down into 3<sup>rd</sup> place and making it an Aussie trifecta on the world walk ranking stage!)

Isaac, whose record-breaking time of **41:48.76**, incredibly, came in his first attempt at the distance, did not have things all his own way, especially early on. A powerful lead pack comprising Beacroft, Housden, Owen Toyne (ACT), Sam McCure (QLD) and Kodi Clarkson (ACT) made this a gripping contest until only Housden remained to continue the challenge. The Queenslander would lose contact only gradually, taking 2<sup>nd</sup> in **41:57.38**, a PB of 3:23. Both times were U20 World Junior qualifiers.

While we speak of top seniors in terms of 'world class', it's the juniors who catch our eye as potential future stars, ones we hope will remain in the sport to realize that potential. Our current 16-19yo cohort exemplifies that hope – with Isaac and Bailey its latest torchbearers.

Congratulations, lads ... may you continue to improve and inspire younger walkers to follow in your footsteps.

## NEW SOUTH WALES ANSW 10,000m Walk c'ships, November 25 – SOPAC, Sydney

Damp conditions aside, there were fireworks at the Sydney Olympic Athletics Centre as the 10,000m walkers took to the track for the State championships on Saturday night. Some interstate talent joined the NSW contenders and lifted the standard accordingly, although in the Men's race in particular, it didn't require lifting far. **David Tarbotton** reports on an exceptional night for Australian race walking:

## NSW 10km Walk: Isaac Beacroft smashes Australian record

On a gloomy night at Homebush, the athletes really shone, led by 16-year-old **Isaac Beacroft** setting an Australian Under-18 10,000m walk record, his third in less than a year, and astonishingly on debut at the distance. In the women's, sisters **Allanah** and **Sienna Pitcher**, claimed the open and under-20 10000m walk titles.

show today.

From the gun, Isaac was in a three-way battle for the under-20 and open NSW 10,000m walk titles, up against a regular rival, Canberra's **Owen Toyne**, and rising Queensland talent, **Bailey Housden**. They went stride for stride for 20 laps – 8km. Owen was the first to crack, eventually not finishing. Housden was unshakable until a mile to go.

"About 1500m to go I put a bit of a surge in," said Beacroft. It was decisive as he opened up a gap of about 20 metres. He pushed on to claim the title in a stunning time of **41:48.76**. The time was a world under-18 leading time for 2023, broke the NSW under-18 record and he now sits number six Australian under-20 all-time behind five Olympians. It was also his third Australian record in less than a year, following his under-16 3000m record and under-18 5000m walk.

"I'm stocked, I couldn't be any happier. First ever race at that distance and I don't think I could have asked for a better outcome," said Beacroft.

"Training leading into the race had been a bit choppy. Two weeks ago, I walked 20:13.27 and had COVID pretty hard in the leadup to that race."

He also had been suffering from a knee injury for over a month, which maybe have been a blessing in disguise, as it forced him to forgo a large part of his training, jogging, and concentrate on race walk training only. The time was also a World U20 Championships qualifier. "It is a big goal – I have it marked on the calendar," said Beacroft, but he knows there is tremendous depth chasing those two Australian team places and some of them were on

"Those guys (today) are extraordinary walkers. We are so lucky to have, in my age group and the one above, a group walking real quick times. Everyone is coming through. It is so good for the sport."

### Allanah Pitcher Open women 10,000m walk

After a busy year, which was capped off with competing at the 2023 World Championships, Central Coast's **Allanah Pitcher** (SYU) was uncertain how the race would go.

"At this point in the season, you don't really know where you are sitting," said Pitcher. "Training has been going well so I knew we'd be on for something quick, but I was not really sure if quick would mean sub-46 minutes or 47 or 48." Pitcher gave us an insight into her race plan.

"The first 10 laps I like to keep it comfortable, see how the pace is going and what the race is doing, and let them take care of themselves. Then from 15 laps I started going for it. Today I was excited approaching those last 15 laps as I knew I had a lot left in me."

Pitcher received good competition early from former NSW junior star, a two-time World Junior competitor and now based in Queensland - **Tayla Billington**. But Pitcher pulled away to win in **46:02.81**, from Billington with **46:54.49**. It was an excellent time for Pitcher, the second fastest of her career. Her pathway to National team representative in in 2024 is different than her 2023 campaign at the world championships which was over 35km. For Paris Olympics, and the World Race Walking Teams Championship in April, it will be a more speed focused approach - dropping down to the only Olympic events on the program – the 20km walk and 10km teams race.

#### Sienna Pitcher U20 women 10,000m walk

Matching the achievement of the Saville sisters, Jane and Natalie in the '90s, Allanah's younger sister, **Sienna Pitcher** claimed the under-20 10,000m walk title by three minutes in a solid time of **50:58.27**.

"I started here not expecting too much, but I've done better that I ever expected," said Sienna. "It was a bit daunting with all the older kids. Time was okay - I broke the 51-minute barrier and I feel now I should be able to go under 50 minutes."

Although only 15, her goal is a World U20 Championships qualifying time of 49:30, which she feels should be achievable this summer. She will be young enough for not just the 2024 World U20s, but also the 2026 championships.

JAPAN: Osaka Mixed Walking relay, 25 November - Osaka

## China team wins Osaka Walking Mixed Relay

(reprinted from O Marchador - Monday 27 November)

For the first time in Japan, the Mixed Walking Relay (42.195 km) took place yesterday, in the heart of the city of Osaka, with 8 Walking Judges, some of them at the Gold level of the World Championship, taking part in compliance with the established rules.

The Chinese duo, **Haifeng Qian** and **Liujing Yang**, victoriously completed the new athletics distance, an event that will be included in the Paris 2024 Olympic Games program, achieving a global time of **3:05:31**, the fourth best world mark at the time

In second place was the Japanese team made up of **Tomohiro Noda** and **Kaori Kawazoe**, with **3:07:16**, with the Japanese duo **Yutaro Murayama** and **Yukiko Umeno** finishing the podium, with **3:10:32**.

There were 12 participating teams (9 arrivals and 2 disqualifications).

In the men's 10 km (Under-20) triumph came to **Yugo Nagata**, with a time of **42:43**, just 12 seconds off his personal record, set in February this year, in Kobe, followed by **Taizo Tamaharu**, with **44:03** (9 seconds away from his personal best), and **Kyogo Nishiwaki**, with **47:20**.

In the women's 5km, Yoka Kondo, with 23:42, was the winner. Sumika Tani, with 23:46, was second, and Honami Kakajima, with 24:26, was third.

The next two international race walking competitions, to be held on Japanese soil, will be the 72nd edition of the New Year's Grand Prix, at the beginning of 2024, in Tokyo, and on February 18, 2024, the 107th edition of the Japan Championships of 20 and 35 km walk, in Kobe, knowing that the program of the next World Athletics Championships, in Tokyo, in 2025, will include the 20 and 35 km walk events.
