Having stepped up from Little Athletics competition to AVSL this summer and racing only her second 3000m, Lucy showed she has great potential by taking 4th place in the U15 race with a PB margin of 1:11 ... easily the biggest improvement across all walks at the meet. Well done, Lucy!

In my post on the VRWC's Facebook page, I stated that all five Victorians in the 5000m has registered PBs. This was erroneous, based on statistics on AA's results page that may have been counting seed times. By the end of the championships, however, we still had our five PBs!

The national All Schools championships can be counted on to deliver something special each year, and 2023 was no exception ... not as far as walking was concerned. In Perth last weekend, those fortunate enough to be trackside were treated to exemplary displays by two young athletes – **Isaac Beacroft (NSW)** and **Kodi Clarkson (ACT)** – that have earned them their latest WOTW awards. Both boys broke Australian records (Isaac the U18 and U20 5000m with **19:31.21**, and Kodi the U16 3000m, just missing the 12:00 barrier to record **12:00.10.**)

Isaac: "I don't go into competitions to come second." Aside from his speed and flawless technique, nothing defines the NSW star more than this determination to win, and win thoroughly. Those who weren't in the stands but have seen Isaac win before know well how he does it, and would have done it last Friday. See the race report for details.

Kodi has been recording times that belie his age across an array of distances for a couple of years now, and this performance confirms that he's no flash in the pan but one of the exciting prospects destined to take over the

mantle of Australia's international walking arsenal.

Well done, Isaac and Kodi! We eagerly await your appearance at the National T&F titles in Adelaide next April.

*Honourable mentions

- Bailey Housden (QLD) came tantalizingly close to breaking 20:00, clocking 20:07.56 in taking silver in the U17 5000m in Perth
- Maddison Nash (VIC) a dominant performance in winning the Girls U18 5000m with her first sub-25:00 time.
- Sophie Polkinghorne (NSW) supreme in the Girls U14 3000m, on target for a new meet record until the last lap.
- Mya McClure (VIC) chased Sophie hard all the way, finishing 8secs behind to take silver with a PB.
- Angelina LeGrand (SA) a controlled, well-judged race to come steadily through the U16 3000m field from last place to win by 41secs.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA National All Schools T&F c'ships, 8-10 December – WAAS, Perth

Beacroft, Clarkson break National records in All Schools

Favourable temperatures – if not winds – greeted the nation's school athletes who assembled at the West Australian Athletic Stadium for this year's championships. Excellent results were observed across the whole program over three days, and the race walkers were not backward in providing their quota.

The hallmarks of the meet were the three Australian records set by **Isaac Beacroft (NSW)** and **Kodi Clarkson (ACT)**. Beacroft, up to now an infrequent racer, has given rise to anticipation of something special every time he does front for a walking race, and so far he has delivered with no sign of faltering. Meanwhile, the phrase 'punching above his weight' could have been coined with Clarkson in mind. Talented, dedicated and precociously fast, Kodi was the only walker to double up at the meet, using the rigorous 5000m as a warm-up for his own record-breaking effort in the 3000m a day later.

It was both disheartening and bewildering to see the YouTube live streaming of the Day 1 program – which had provided good coverage of the Girls 5000m walk – cease transmission minutes before the Boys' field arrived on the track. Athletics Australia defended the decision on budgetary and equity grounds, pointing out the limited streaming window available and the need to cover all events. Granted ... but the fact remains that local and international viewers missed out on seeing what had to

be one of the finest junior race walking lineups anywhere in the world – a field containing 7 of this year's World Athletics U18 top 10 – in action. The U15/U16 Boys 3000m the next day would suffer the same fate. Hopefully this will not occur in the Nationals in Adelaide ... as, indeed, it did this year in Brisbane.

Friday 8 December

The U18 and U17 5000m walkers got the proceedings off to a cracking start. The U17 saw NSW wunderkind Isaac Beacroft demolishing Troy Sundstrom's 23-year old national U20 record as well as his own U18 mark with 19:31.21 ... a time unimaginable for one so young virtually anywhere in the world until recently. Bailey Housden, having a breakout summer of his own and in no way intimidated by Isaac after their recent close tussle in the NSW 10,000m titles, notched a 23sec PB to go close to a sub-20min result himself. Riley Coughlan rounded out the medals with another showing of speedy consistency for his 20:54.98.

On this occasion, sadly, fortune wasn't kind to the country's two other 16yo stars, **John Ronan** and **Owen Toyne**. The two will bounce back, and we'll await the National T&F titles in Adelaide with all the more eagerness.

Sienna Pitcher, as expected, was dominant in the Girls U17, clocking 24:31.30 finishing 2³/₄ minutes ahead of team mate Lyla Williams with Isabelle Curtis claiming bronze, the home state's first walk medal of the meet.

Victoria's **Maddison Nash** was equally commanding in the U18 race, breaking 25mins for the first time for **24:50.14**. Behind her, **Chelsea Roberts** and **Hana Jugovic** were also rewarded with PBs to go with their new bling.

All five of the Boys U18 field produced excellent results. **Marcus Wakim** walked his own race rather than mix it with Isaac and Bailey, winning clearly over young **Kodi Clarkson** who jumped an age group and took 2nd for the first leg of his podium double ... a foretaste of what was to come the day after. **Scott Peart**, 3rd, continues to improve, this time holding off **Sam McCure** who had arguably the best time of the championships *not* to earn a medal.

Saturday 9 December

As mentioned above, the ACT's **Kodi Clarkson** was the standout performer in the U15/U16 cohort, taking nearly 5 seconds off Isaac Beacroft's national U16 3000m record to clock **12:00.10** – a stunning performance. Tasmania's **Sam Lindsay** made the most of the long trip west to take silver in **13:12.78**, with **Alexander Sinnett** finishing 3rd and adding another medal to the NSW haul.

It was a good day for the South Australian girls with **Angelina Legrand** winning convincingly in **15:28.25**, ahead of team mate **Elise Scott 16:09.90** who had led early. **Milly Sharpe**, from sugar cane country and with limited racing opportunities, wasn't going to let a medal chance slip by.

All four finishers in the Boys U15 race recorded PBs, with Victorian **Max Davidson** outlasting NSW's **Jaxson Horton**, **14:33.23** to **14:39.91** in a close contest and **Trent D'Alessio** clinching a hometown medal.

NSW's **Matilda Webb** and **Jessica Loring** were tipped to feature highly in the U15 Girls race and did so, walking the early laps hard in company with the ACT's **Emma Grocott**. Webb put the foot down with four to go, winning comfortably in **14:44.90**, while Grocott finished well clear of Loring in 2nd.


Sunday 10 December

It was the **Sophie Polkinghorne** show on the Sunday morning as the young NSW ace set out after team mate Matilda Webb's U14 3000m meeting record, set last year. She had plenty of incentive, with Victorian **Mya McClure** keeping in touch and ready to pounce if she faltered. She didn't, and although the record eluded her she held on to win the title in **14:34.27**. McClure's attacking walking earned her silver and a PB of **14:42.30**, while **Ella Cosgrave** wrung herself out to take 3rd in **16:36.28**.

Tall, long-striding Queenslander **Noah Cooke** won the final walks gold of the meet, winning in a PB of **14:55.04** ahead of local contender **Keiran Smith**, whose quick-fire technique propelled him to silver in **15:09.47** with Victorian **Jaime Hvalica** heading for the airport with the bronze medal.
