In the 3000m Walk, held on Saturday, **Mark Blackwood** and **Carolyn Rosenbrock** were clear overall winners. Mark came home over a minute ahead of **Mark Thomas** in an excellent **13:46.80**, while Carolyn had a bit more of a battle to stay ahead of her Croydon team mate **Sandra Geisler**.

Allanah Pitcher (NSW) takes out this week's WOTW following her 1:24 PB performance in winning the NSW 5000m Walk title last weekend.

Allanah's time of 21:49.49 would have been something of a surprise to many, coming as it did off two bouts of debilitating illness during which she spent time on an I-V drip in hospital in Taicang, China, after what may or may not have been food poisoning. Already recovering from a prior illness and with her immune system on the ropes, this second setback may have flattened any other athlete for a considerable time.

But then, who is physically fitter than Allanah Pitcher? She has rallied in a most emphatic fashion and is back in shape to prepare for the National track 10,000m title in Adelaide next month. Beyond that awaits the prospect of the World Walking Teams championship in Antalya (TUR) and a full calendar of racing both at home and overseas.

Congratulations, Allanah. A stirring example of bouncing back!

NEW SOUTH WALES ANSW Open T&F c'ships, 15-17 March – SOPAC, Sydney

Last Friday evening's Open ANSW titles saw astonishing walking performances from two of the nation's most exciting young prospects – one a national record breaker and the other bouncing back impressively from illness. **David Tarbotton** provided the following report:

NSW OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS: BEACROFT RACES TO AN AUSTRALIAN RECORD, NOW #2 IN THE WORLD

Ahead of a key month in his career, Hills race walker **Isaac Beacroft**, 16, won the NSW Open 5000m walk to launch the four-day NSW Championships. The women's winner, **Alannah Pitcher**, won in a 84 seconds PB, signalling she was back to her best and past two bouts of illness.

Isaac won the men's State title in a superfast time of 19:23.96, to break his own Australian U18 and U20 records and clock the second fastest time on the U18 World all-time list. Only Russian Sergey Shirobokov in 2016 has walked faster. Shirobokov performance was achieved indoors and only added to the all-time list in January.

"The first two kilometres were pretty comfy then on the third kilometre I ramped it up, then had to dig deep on the last two and hold on to clock sub-19:30 – that was my goal," Issac said. In December his performance would have been a World U18 best ever performance.

Isaac is expected to be named next week to make his Australian team debut at the World Race Walking Teams Championship in Turkey in late April. Ahead of that he will race the trials for the World Juniors – the National U20 10,000m walk in Adelaide in early April.

After breakthrough performances in the last 12 months and especially at the January 2024 Supernova 10,000m walk in Canberra, Allanah Pitcher was grounded by two bouts of illness. At the Australian 20km Walk championships in Adelaide in February she was suffering from COVID, then with an Australian team in Taicang just 10 days ago, she became very ill before the race.

"I got food poisoning or a gastro bug, we are not too sure which, but it is pretty much the same symptoms. So I had to go on a drip the day before the race," explained Allanah. "It's a learning curve, you have to be so careful overseas."

Considering Allanah's illness, today's performance just 10 days later, was remarkable. She clocked **21:49.49**, to finish ahead of **Lizzy McMillen** (**22:00.19**), while training partners **Hannah Mison** and **Hannah Bolton** battled for the bronze with Mison taking it in **22:33.42**, just ahead of Bolton with **22:37.00**.

In the men's medal battle behind Isaac Beacroft, it was a similar story. Second was 2022 world championships representative **Carl Gibbons** in **19:57.06**, while the battle for the bronze was also between training partners, and surprisingly **Jack McGinniskin** (21:17.27) held off **Dylan Richardson** (21:24.37).

COACHING POINT

FRANK OVERTON ... COACH OF THE COAST

Of the 18 walkers who finished the ANSW 5000m Walk championships last weekend, no fewer than 11 share the same coach – **Frank Overton.**

Based in Gosford on the NSW Central coast, Frank has built one of the most enduring squads of elite and up-and-coming walkers seen in Australia. Among Frank's roster are present or past international reps Allanah Pitcher, Carl Gibbons, Tyler Jones and Ian Rayson, along with Dylan Richardson, Jack McGinniskin, Hannah Mison, Hannah Bolton, Myles Ashby, Chelsea Roberts, Sienna Pitcher, Bridget Bell and Lilah Norden. And this is surely not an exhaustive list, though it's exhausting to list them!

Readers who raced from the late '60s to '80s will no doubt recall Frank as a regular presence in NSW representative squads. While not in the same speed realm as counterparts Frank Clark, Steve Hausfeld or Eddie Dawkins, he was always

good for team points in road contests such as the National 20 and 50km titles as well as the Canberra 20 mile classic. (The last time Frank and I raced each other was in the 1981 Australian 50km championship at Fisherman's Bend in Melbourne, a horrible day of high wind and roller-coaster temperatures in which we gee'd each other up through the tough final laps.)

Lack of an elite racing background of one's own, however, is no barrier to coaching success. Nobody could achieve what Frank has as a coach – not only enriching the lives of his pupils to an immeasurable degree but arguably saving the sport at senior level in his home state – without a deep and abiding love for that sport, a desire to see it prosper and the determination to apply everything he has to that end. Race walkers everywhere – and Australian athletics – are richer for his efforts.

We salute you, Frank! Whatever it is you do, keep doing it!

SLOVAKIA: Dudinska 50: World Athletics Race Walking Tour Gold Event #2, 17 March - Dudince

Always a good indicator of early season form and – as with the earlier Taicang meeting – especially appealing in an Olympic year, this year's Dudinska 50 was a double triumph for Peru ... and no, Kimberley Garcia was not half of it!

Rodriguez and Inga claim Peruvian double in Dudince

The Dudinska 50 – the second **World Athletics Race Walking Tour Gold** event of the year – was a triumph for Peru. They took both wins in the two 20km races in the spa town of Dudince in Slovakia on Saturday (16), although the women's event produced a big surprise.

In the men's race, Cesar Rodriguez set a national record when coming home in 1:19:41 to beat favourite Brian Pintado of Ecuador (1:19:44) in the process.

The real breakthrough came from India's **Ram Baboo**, who only joined the leaders at 15km and moved through the gears to shatter his PB with **1:20:00**. It was more than minute better than the 1:21:04 set in January by the 24-year-old, who will have a very happy birthday on Wednesday.

Pintado attempted to stamp his authority on the race from the gun, and was clear of the chasing pack of a score or more by the first one kilometre lap, which was covered in 3:58. However, the rest quickly drew level, with **Aurelien Quinion** from France picking up the baton followed by a dwindling group.

The lead see-sawed up to quarter distance. Pintado got the nod but only by two seconds (20:10) with a group of 10 in close order. By 9km, the leader was looking around to see how much opposition was left. The answer was that same group of 10, showing no signs of wilting. His fellow Ecuadorean **David Hurtado** was first through the line at halfway in 40:20, with five seconds separating the next nine.

That group was down to five with Baboo showing for the first time as a contender by 15km (1:00:11). Hurtado and Quinion were casualties and 11 seconds off the pace. Thereafter, it was a duel between the first two, with the fast-finishing Baboo coming like a train right behind to post a last kilometre of 3:49.

Dominik Cerny notched a heartening **1:20:31** PB for fourth, and behind the Slovakian athlete was Quinion and **Jose Alejandro Barrondo** from Guatemala, diving over the line for fifth and sixth in that order.

Peru triumphed in the women's 20km as well, but not through the expected winner.

Evelyn Inga came out of the shadow of her more illustrious teammate **Kimberly Garcia** to break the tape in 1:27:42 - with a huge gap to second place. In fact, double 2022 world champion Garcia lasted exactly two 1-kilometre laps before stepping off the road due to illness.

Instead, Inga took command in the last six kilometres to shake off the last of her chasers and underline Peru's growing status as a walking force. **Mariia Sakharuk** showed early, with a five-second advantage after the first circuit.

The big surprise was Garcia. The 2023 35km winner here was already well off the pace and moving backward as early as the first lap. Likewise, double 2022 world silver medallist **Katarzyna Zdzieblo** was drifting back at an alarming rate. The Pole was close to a minute down on the leader by 3km, and struggling.

A third Peruvian, **Mary Andia**, made inroads on the lead and had drawn level by 5km, reached in 21:44, with Sakharuk from Ukraine breathing down her neck. Right behind came **Ilse Guerrero** and Inga, with Zdzieblo more than 1:30 down and in unlucky 13th place. Halfway was reached in 43:34 and Sakharuk had been joined by Inga and Guerrero from Mexico, with Andia falling away over the next kilometre. One tour after that and it was Sakharuk's turn to give way, with the race down to two.

Lap 14 was the decider. Inga took off and put 12 seconds between her and Guerrero. That gap doubled over the next kilometre, with the race now decided. The race for second was closer, with Sakharuk prevailing in 1:29:14 to just get the nod over Andia (1:29:19). Guerrero was fourth in 1:29:33. And although she wasn't at her best, Zdzieblo gritted it out for a distant sixth in 1:31:41.

The overnight rain was evident on the slick streets when the 35km walkers got going alongside the U20 10km. **Andrea Agrusti** was originally down to contest the tiny field in the 35km. Italy still won, but it was late entry **Teodorico Caporaso** who broke the tape in **2:34:43** for a world lead.

The early cool conditions did nothing to dampen the enthusiasm of Caporaso, who was already 12 seconds up on USA's **Nick Christie** and Ecuador's **Octavio Calderon** by 5km. The Italian went through in a sprightly 22:07, chasing a PB, 2:32:14.

By 20km (1:28:17), Caporaso had almost two minutes on Calderon and six on Christie. At 30km, reached in 2:12:39, the lead had grown to a kilometre, although the race, such as it was, had long been decided. Calderon was second in **2:41:14** and Christie, third and last in **2:59:34**.

The U20 10km races produced a Mexican double: **Emiliano Barba** in **42:06**, equalling his PB, and **Renata Cortes** in **46:36**.

The marathon relay saw an experimental Greek team of **Sofia Alikanioti** and **Georgios Kritoulis** take command from early on and come home **3:18:38** ahead of Croatia and two teams from Czechia.

FRANCE: French 20 & 35km championships, 17 March – Fontenay le Comte

Emmanuel Tardi is back with his report of the first of the 2024 French road championships. Numbers participating – no doubt inspired by the coming Olympics – would be very heartening for the organisers.

I was this Sunday in Fontenay le Comte (400km to the south-west of Paris) for our national championship 20km and 35km.

The 35km started first at 9am. Only 11 starters (4 women and 7 men). In the women's event, **Caroline Osmont, Bertille Peslerbe** and **Lucie Champalou** walked together for about 20k (reached in 1h 46m), then Osmont stayed alone in the front of the race and she won easily, beating the French national record.

The men's 35km was very interesting. **Kilian Lebreton** started fast and was the leader for the full race. **Come Martin** walked in 2nd place for 33k. The podium seems okay, but after 30km they suddenly walked slower and slower. **Roland Landron**, who was 7mins behind at the 20k point, came back, caught Come Martin and finished only a few meters behind Lebreton.

The 20km was scheduled at 9:30am for women and 11:45 for men. In the women's event **Pauline Stey** and **Camille Moutard** walked together for 18km. They reached the halfway point in 45'05". In the last two laps, Stey took an advantage of 20 meters.

In the men's event, Gabriel Bordier was followed by Kevin Campion for the first two laps, then he won easily.


