







** VALE RONALD (RONNIE) MILLER ... 1940-2024 **



Today I received the sad news of the passing on June 27 of **Ronnie Miller** ... VAWC members for 69 years, competitor, official and – as you will see from his Life member citation below, one of the Club's saviours during the approach and turn of the millennium.

Tim Erickson compiled the following resume of Ron's engagement with the sport of race walking. One who walked the walk in every sense of the word and talked little – least of all about himself. Ron was one of those priceless people who derive their greatest fulfillment from working for the benefit of others:

Ron joined VAWC in late 1955 as a 14 year old. Like so many of our walkers, he came from the Collingwood Harriers club. His walking career lasted some 20 years and perhaps his greatest achievement was to gain 2nd place in the Malaysian 20 km Championship in 1965 while serving overseas in the Australian army.

He retired from competition in the seventies and turned his attentions to managing junior teams at the Collingwood venue and officiating. He did the first exam for walk judges when the Little Athletics movement started in 1967. He has been an AV official since the early seventies. He has been coaching for some 40 years.

For his services to the many clubs with which he has been associated, Ron has life memberships of VRWC, Collingwood Harriers and Collingwood Little Athletics Club.

Within VRWC, Ron has been on the Committee for many years. He served as secretary for 12 years, from 1989 to 2000. It was during this time that we lost our clubrooms and the club went through a particularly low period. Ron was one of the hard workers who helped the club come through that period and regroup at its new headquarters at the

Middle Park Bowling Club. As well as being Secretary, Ron has been race secretary for many years and has, perhaps, a greater working knowledge of the club than any other current member.

My own recollections of Ron go back to my first days at the Club in 1967. He was competing on a regular basis then, and he was memorable for enjoying a cigarette after his races. (He wasn't alone in that, to be honest.) A quiet man, Ron accepted everybody with a genuine, blue collar equanimity – if you were fair dinkum and spoke nicely to people, you were okay by him. Ron was himself the very model of the fair dinkum 'doer' who loved the Collingwood and VRWC clubs and engaged in whatever needed doing to keep them thriving. His final years at the VRWC were pretty much as they had been for decades. You saw him there each week, year round, latterly as Race secretary and timekeeper, quietly assuring our confidence that, as long as he had charge of the stopwatch and race sheets, all would be well.

The VRWC expresses its sincere condolences to Ron's family, friends and associates. At his request, there will be no funeral.

Thank you, Ronnie, for the part you played in the VAWC/VRWC's enviable history and its growth to the current healthy position it enjoys.

Two of our youngest members, Addison Frenken and Payton Welsh, gamely tackled races of twice the furthest distance they'd gone before and posted pleasing first-up times. Traralgon siblings Matilda and Pippa Read showed good speed and excellent technique in winning their races.

Meanwhile, **Max Davidson** and **Angus Shuttleworth** joined Eden Morgan as the only ones to average sub-5:00 kilometres on the day.

The **Intervals race** is another of our popular 'special' races – in fact it's a mixture of race and speed training session. There are several approaches, including setting one's own pace goals and lap target times, or going out hard and hanging on for as long as you can.

In the Intervals Race, walkers choose to walk either 6km, 8km or 10km in 2km intervals.

To walk in this event, you must be able to complete each leg in **less than 17 minutes**. If, for example, you walk 11.30min for the 1st leg, you have 5.30min rest before starting the next leg. If a walker fails to finish any leg in the allowable 17 minutes, he/she will not be allowed to continue in the next leg.

The start times for the 2km legs are as follows:

Your 2km repetition times will be added to give you your final aggregate time for the race distance you complete.

British 10,000m race walk record for Callum Wilkinson

The 27-year-old is hopeful of Olympic selection and now has his sights set on the national 20km record

Callum Wilkinson smashed his own UK 10,000m race walks record on Sunday and says if he's picked for the Paris Olympics he wants to try to break Tom Bosworth's national 20km record of 79:38.

Wilkinson, 27, clocked **38:43.91** to beat his previous mark of 39:05.85 which was set in Newport in 2021 a few months before he finished 10th in the Tokyo Olympics 20km.

"I think it is enough [for Paris] and probably went even better than I was aiming for so long as no one has done anything crazy fast across the world this weekend," said Wilkinson, who was ninth in the European Championships in Rome earlier this month.

"The championship race in Paris will be different. I really want the British 20km record. I feel I have got that in me. It is the one I have always wanted since I was young.

"I will go straight to altitude after this to St Moritz as it is my favourite place in the world to train. The elite endurance set-up is so strong in this country."

He added: "My one bit of advice to anyone who qualifies here is to enjoy it and treat it as your last Olympics not your first. I have had so many injuries and surgeries since the last Olympics to be back in this position is so exciting and I really enjoy it. I have matured in the last three years and to go again is for me."

Santacreu and Meilán dream of joint Spanish success in Lima

Sofia Santacreu may have been injured in the months prior to the World Athletics Race Walking Team Championships Antalya 24 but her competitive streak helped her excel once again on the international scene.

The European U18 and U20 champion sustained an injury in her tibialis last November and her training regime was seriously hampered until March when she could finally resume training, just in time for the global event in Antalya.

Her only race in the lead-up to that came five weeks before heading to Antalya, clocking a PB of 45:25 over 10km in Valencia. Then, when it really mattered in the Turkish city, Santacreu once again broke her PB to finish third in 45:17.

China, represented by Yang Xizhen, Chen Meiling and Duo Jiecuo, were heavily favoured to take the individual and team victories. Yang took the individual title, but Aldara Meilán and Santacreu prevented a Chinese sweep of the podium by finishing second and third respectively, and then led Spain to gold in the team standings.

"In the weeks prior to Antalya, I felt as though simply competing in Antalya was a gift because I'd almost ruled out being there," said

Santacreu. "Fortunately, I recovered on time – perhaps not 100%, but enough to be competitive. "My teammates Aldara Meilán and Griselda Serret and I were confident of making the podium in the team competition, but honestly we didn't expect to win gold."

Since that competition, Santacreu has intentionally eased her training load before starting her preparations for the World Athletics U20 Championships Lima 24. The 18-year-old will be aiming for another podium finish at the global event in the Peruvian capital, but she's not taking anything for granted.


"It will be my first season training throughout the summer, so I'm not sure how my body will respond," says the Barcelona-born Santacreu. "I'll also try to align my body clock to Lima's time zone so that I won't suffer from jet lag."

When she talks about Meilán – arguably one of her toughest opponents in her quest for a berth in Lima – she does so with undisguised affection. "I admire her," she says. "She is so strong, both physical and mentally, and I like her race walking style. I think we are quite similar in many ways."

Santacreu took up race walking at the age of 14 after practising ballet in her early childhood, but when the pandemic hit, it interrupted her progression. She took advantage of the confinement, however, to help others.

"A family friend suggested that I make some basic exercise charts for children admitted to the hospital that were easy to understand and do," she explains. "I thought it was a great idea so I set about drawing. After a year and I half, we'd created a comprehensive book."

The profits of the book, entitled 'Entrena con Sofia' ('Training with Sofia'), have been donated to several social causes.

"I'm very grateful of the warm reception and the love that the people who have received the book have given to our work," she says.

Earlier this year, Santacreu left her long-term coach Sergio Ezquerro and started training with Alejandro Aragoneses, coach to Paul McGrath. But Santacreu's philosophy remains the same.

"Beyond medals and age-group records, athletics allows me to get to know myself and grow as a person through the great experiences I'm living and the nice people I get to know," says Santacreu, who will begin her university studies in physiotherapy in September after graduating at the French Lyceum in Barcelona.

As a 17-year-old, Meilán is too young to get the Spanish car driving license or take a flight without her parents' permission, but she showed great maturity in Antalya.

She entered the event as the newly-minted national champion, thanks to a 45:04 clocking in Zaragoza a couple of months earlier, but like with Santacreu, her performance in the Turkish coastal city exceeded expectations.

"Of course, we were aware we had a good chance of

taking a team medal but we didn't expect to take gold ahead of China," she said. "I'm really proud of my teammates Sofia and Griselda (sixth) as we displayed the current high level of Spanish race walking. And the team gold medal gives me more joy than the individual runner-up spot.

"Surprisingly for us, the race started slowly, but then our coaches advised us to take the lead and set a quicker rhythm and that tactic eventually paid off."

After going through the half-way point in 23:20, Meilán covered the second half in a swift 21:52 for an overall time of 45:12, just six seconds behind the winner.

Though she loves race walking now, it wasn't love at first sight for Meilán.

"I used to do different disciplines when I took up athletics, but race walking didn't really attract my attention," she recalls. "I remember I used to do technical exercises quite carelessly, but everything changed at a training camp when I joined a group of race walkers coached by my now lifelong coach Javier Piñeiro, who told me I could be good at it."

Piñeiro was right, and it wasn't long before Meilán achieved her first success on the international scene. Two years ago, she earned silver over 5000m at the European Youth Olympic Festival in Banska Bystrica, then the following season she finished second in the U20 10km at the European Race Walking Team Championships in Podebrady.

Having earned a third successive championships silver medal in Antalya, Meilán will have an opportunity to compete for gold in Lima. But for her, a gold medal isn't the be-all and end-all.

"The World U20 Championships is still two months away and a lot of things could happen during then, so my only plan now is to remain focused on my daily training," she said. "I wouldn't predict anything right now; I guess the Chinese athletes will be fighting for the medals alongside Sofia and hopefully myself, let's see what happens there.

"Simply knowing that I have given it 100% in a competition, regardless of where I finish, is by far the most important thing to me," she added. "Having said that, I'm also very ambitious. But every event is different, and I'll always be satisfied, provided I do my very best."

The admiration that Santacreu has for Meilán is very much reciprocated. "I really admire Sofia," says Meilán. "She's really hard working and is so nice and always cares about others. I consider her a friend rather than a rival; it's great to be on the same team as her at international championships. We're at a very similar level and either one of us can beat the other on any given day. I'm so happy for everything she achieves and she for me, I'm sure."

Just a few days after the World U20 Championships, Meilán will turn 18 and move to Madrid – about 500km away from her hometown – to begin her university studies in physical education. By then, another medal could well be hanging around her neck, or Santacreu's. Or even both.

Dear Stuart,

I have read the report of Bob Cruise about the DQ of Segura in Sydney.

At the time everything seemed so scandalous and the international press had amplified the whole thing out of all proportion.

I talked about it with my friend Lamberto Vacchi, now 84 years old, who on the occasion of the twentieth anniversary of Jane Saville's disqualification had also had an interview with an Australian newspaper, and I think I can affirm that the story told by Bob Cruise is perfectly in line with what happened at the time.

Lamberto was also kind enough to give me a copy of the decision of the CAS which had then judged the Mexican Federation's appeal in Sydney.

I'm sending it to you so you too can have all this historical documentation and publish it if it's of interest.

As for Jane, I have spoken to her about this topic several times (including on the occasion of my 75th birthday party which we held in La Coruna and to which Jane had been invited by me). Frankly I must say that both Jane and Elisabetta Perrone today recognize that Lamberto's actions as Chief Judge of that competition could not have been different.

Congratulations to you for wanting to remember those two days with Bob Cruise.

Best wishes, Nicola Maggio, Italy I read with interest the forwarded Heel & Toe article written by Australian judge, Bob Cruise. He described both men and women 20km races at the Sydney 2000 Olympics and the controversies following significant disqualifications. Before I raced my 50kms I watched both 20kms including assisting friend and GB teammate, Lisa Kehler. My personal memories of the women's event reached fever pitch during the closing stages. Dashing from the road circuit back to the stadium I took up a trackside position. Just in time, I gazed back up at the huge screen to see Australia's Jane Saville in the tunnel seemingly heading for a gold medal. The stadium rocking with joyful noise was like a flag waving carnival. It was spine-tingling. The mood was about to change. Before Saville entered the mouth of the tunnel her progress was suddenly halted by a disqualification card being thrust in front of her. Her pained anguish was there for all to see on the screen. The stadium fell virtually silent. Seconds later China's Wang Liping emerged out of the tunnel onto the track to little more than a ripple of applause. In shock myself, I gathered my muddled thoughts to capture this photo. I thought, China's Wang Liping striding towards her greatest triumph must have felt like she'd entered the world's largest morgue.

This is sad news for those of us, in Australia and elsewhere, who recall that moment in time – 1967 to 1974 - when America's race walking flame blazed briefly but brightly, through the agencies of Larry Young (Olympic 50km bronze in 1968 and 1972), Ron Laird (twice 3^{rd} in the Lugano Cup 20km, 1967 and 1974), Goetz Klopfer, Rudy Haluza, Tom Dooley, Dave Romansky and, later, others such as Marco Evoniuk, Curt Clausen, Tim Seaman and John Nunn. While these many not have challenged for Olympic podium honours, they kept the flickering flame of American race walking alight for upcoming generations to emulate.

And they were just the men. Since 1971, the US female walkers have been out there plying their art in this demanding sport, without yet breaking through into the higher echelons internationally but, again, providing a beacon for other female walkers Stateside. Unfortunately, it appears that the beacon cannot be seen by enough of either sex to inspire a critical mass of walkers to form and push each other to the levels now necessary to make it to Olympic selection. Let's hope those coaches and educators working tirelessly to keep the sport alive and healthy in the Land of the Free see their efforts vindicated, enough for a renaissance to occur between now and 2028. Somewhere out there is another Larry Young, waiting to be discovered.

Age Groups


The Championship is conducted in five year age groups starting at 30 years, and medals are awarded in each age group. Your age group is determined by your **age on the day of competition.**
